God Provides and So Does the USDA

In early 2013, a serendipitous and ultimately lucrative meeting occurred between our President, Jon DeVoll, and Steve Smith who was in charge of the Christian Storehouse in Millsboro, an Indian River District food bank. His wife, Joy Smith, was on our CHFB Board of Directors at the time and she urged the meeting. Steve explained to Jon that the Christian Storehouse procured the bulk of their food from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) in Delaware City, DE because they do not charge for the food they provide. The USDA provides a menu of food each month from which we pick. The kinds of food usually available are frozen chickens and ham, canned stews, veggies, fruit and soup, spaghetti, noodles, rice, etc. Jon and the CHFB Board explored this option and its requirements. One was that we ask our clients annually to verify in writing that their family gross income is below a particular level specified by the USDA; hence, the Income Verification Form we now use in our client intake process. We began our association with the USDA in October, 2013. They deliver to the Food Basket once a month and a group of

strong and hardworking CHFB volunteers unload the payload from the trucks.

The USDA has had a powerful impact on our ministry. The annual CHFB budget is over \$100,000 serving more than 2,500 households and about 6,500 to 8,500 individuals annually in recent years. Approximately \$60,000 is needed through our fundraising to cover food and support costs for the Food Basket and another \$42,000 or so in-kind food comes from USDA. CHFB fundraising to meet our \$60,000 annual budget comes from private donations, individual church donations of funds and food, and from grants. In 2015, because of our USDA partnership and the generous donations of time and money to our all-volunteer organization, the CHFB has not had to accept money from our sponsoring organization, the Lewes-Rehoboth Association of Churches (LRAC), to support our food ministry, as we have always had to do in the past. Therefore, LRAC can keep more funds to support and expand its other needed ministries in the Cape District, such as the Community Resource Center (CRC). God does provide, and so does the USDA!
