VOLUNTEER PROFILE: Jon DeVoll

Jon DeVoll must like a good challenge because he certainly has managed important ones in his eight years as Board president of the Cape Henlopen Food Basket. When he became president in 2013 after a few years serving as a Board member, the organization had just relocated from its very small space near the New Life Thrift Shop to a space ten times the size at the Community Resource Center in Rehoboth. Jon and other volunteers did everything from building shelves to establishing connections with USDA and the Food Bank of Delaware. His most recent year was just as challenging. Guiding the organization through the COVID crisis was a juggling act of managing physical space and volunteer resources. Jon would say, however, that his management style is not to manage the volunteers— it is just to set a direction and then avoid telling people what to do. "The talent on our staff is amazing," he comments. "It's what makes the Food Basket work."

An Ohio native and a graduate of Purdue University with a degree in chemical engineering, Jon also completed an MBA at the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania after a two-year stint as an Army Lieutenant. Most of his career was with DuPont, not as an engineer but as a manager of engineers. When Jon retired in 2000, he and his wife Pat, a nurse, moved permanently to Rehoboth Beach from their home in Wilmington. They have three children and seven grandchildren, and they contribute their time and talent to community activities. Both Jon and Pat have volunteered with the CHFB since its start in 2002. Jon's charitable instincts extend even to his hobbies. He is an avid bike-rider and has participated in the MS 150 Bike to the Bay event twenty-eight times raising lots of money for the cause. He is also a skilled woodworker. For years he has been crafting wooden bowls to donate for fundraising events. With these events disappearing this year due to COVID restrictions, Jon has taken to selling his bowls and donating the proceeds to charity.

As Jon begins his next year as Board president, he plans for the Cape Henlopen Food Basket to continue as an efficient benefit to the community. And he hopes for only manageable challenges. **Thank you, Jon!**
